WELCOME HOME BABY!

Oh the joy of having a new baby in your home ... cuddling, coddling, caring for, worrying about, all those endless feedings and cleanings, the joyful pitterpatter of little feet ... I am talking about a new baby kitten, of course! Bringing that new fur-baby home, welcoming him into your life and introducing him to your home and family, both twoand four-legged members ... it's such an exciting, magical time!

Depending on your kitten's personality, it can be an exciting time for him as well, but it can also be quite scary.

Either way, there is a lot for your new kitten to learn and adapt to. And you, as the adopter, are taking over where your kitten's momma left off, which is a big responsibility.



After having been involved with animals, including various animal rescue groups and shelters, for many years, I can honestly say one of the most frustrating things I see is kittens going into homes and then being returned within weeks or months with the reason being that they're not using the litter box consistently. Not many people are willing to take a chance on adopting a kitten or cat that has been labeled a house soiler. Although there are possible other reasons that kittens could start soiling outside of the litter box, I believe the main reason is that a bad habit has developed due to a possible lack of understanding on the part of their guardian.

In general, cats are very clean animals, and kittens are practically born being potty trained. It's important to keep in mind, however, that they are still babies just learning their way in this big world, and they do require a bit of guidance

as they make the transition from being with their mom, and/or in a small cage with the kitty-litter nearby, to their new life in a fresh home with all the different people, animals, and space! When you take a kitten under your wing you must be willing to help ease his way during this major transition period. Giving your new kitten free-run of your entire home without constant supervision is never a good idea for several reasons - a house is just too big with way too much "fun" to be had, way too much trouble to get into, and way too many places in which to crawl into and get lost.

Set your kitten up in a "safe room", where you can leave him and know that he will be safely out of harm's way when you are at work, out shopping, in the yard gardening, entertaining a crowd, busy preparing dinner, etc. This safe room is not a room you will need to keep the kitten in for a great length of time, but rather for the first couple of weeks or so, until you are feeling confident that your kitten will be safe with your other animals, will not be overwhelmed and hiding out of fear, and will be able to find and get to the kitty litter quickly enough whenever he needs to use it.

For your kitten's "safe room" choose a spare room, preferably a bathroom, because bathrooms are small, have few hiding spaces, can easily be kitty-proofed, have washable surfaces and have a sink handy for clean-ups. As part of kitten-proofing this room, you

will want to either remove the garbage can or get the lidded type which animals cannot get into; rig cupboard doors closed so kitty cannot get into them, keep the lid to the toilet closed, make sure there are no soaps, chemicals, creams, make-ups, pastes, etc., available for kitty to get into; make sure there are no strings, floss, bare elastics, etc., laying around as kitty can ingest these in which case they become deadly; if possible remove any electrical cords or at least keep an eye on them to make sure kitty is not playing with/biting them; make sure there are no holes, air vents, etc., which a curious or scared kitten can climb into and disappear; and finally, look at everything from a kitten's eye view to detect any other dangers.

One additional reason to keep your kitten in this room is that whenever you bring a new animal home there is a possibility that, no matter where you've adopted your new kitten from, he may be bringing germs along with him. By keeping him separated from your existing cats for at least 10 days, you are greatly reducing the risk of having those germs spread to them. After the 10 day incubation period, if kitty has not shown any signs of illness, introduce other pets to your new kitten slowly for the best possible results.

In this "safe room" you will supply your baby with a cozy bed, food and water, toys, and a kitty litter box. Spend lots of time in this room with your new kitten, cuddling and comforting him, playing with him,

feeding him, bonding with him, and in general enjoying him and getting to know each other. Make sure kitty is using his kitty litter consistently, praising him whenever he does. Put him in the kitty litter at certain key times such as after awakening, after eating, and after play sessions. If he has any accidents place him in the kitty litter, and clean up after his accident well, using an enzymatic cleaner which is especially designed to break down cat urine and feces. If your kitten likes playing in his kitty litter, gently take him out so he eventually learns this is not acceptable. At this point in your kitten's life do not use a lid on his kitty litter box, for ease of cleaning and monitoring. In addition, if you have a scared kitten, the kitty litter will be less tempting to hide in if there is no lid. By observing your kitten's litter habits, you will be better able to track that he is going regularly, and that "all systems are go", detecting any medical problems early on.

When you bring your kitten out of his "safe room" to give him some time out and about in the home, ideally what you want to do is supervise him at all times, and when you're not able to supervise him, place him back in the "safe room". Monitor any interactions with other animals to make sure kitty is safe, and also that kitty is not driving your other animals crazy with his kitten antics and persistence. Even the best behaved dog may get upset if he has a kitten annoyingly pouncing on his wagging tail, swatting at his

dangling ears, or sniffing at his special bone or toy; even the mellowest of cats can get frustrated with the never-ending play (as they get frustrated, their tail flicks more, creating an irresistible game for kitty!). Never leave them alone together until down the road when you are absolutely certain they are getting along well. Also, watch your new kitten for signs of fear or hiding, and if this is the case it may be best to keep kitty in the safe room a bit longer, spending lots of time with him and working with him to help raise his confidence level. Once again, kitten proof your whole home as you did in his safe room, and do so repeatedly as he grows in size and ability, and is able to reach even more mischief!

When it comes to the kitty litter, remember that it's a big house for a little kitten to navigate. Your kitten may have to use the kitty litter fast, and may not be able to find it, or get to it quickly enough, until he's a bit more mature and also very familiar with his new home. In the beginning it's important that you take your kitten over to the kitty litter box at several key times throughout the day, same as when you were doing so in the safe room - upon awakening, after eating, and after play sessions. In addition, watch your kitten for signs of him having to go potty, such as when he starts to sniff around on, or possibly even dig at, the floor. Once you feel extremely confident in his ability to find the kitty litter and make it there fast enough, you can gradually ease off. Praise your kitten whenever he uses the kitty litter. Eventually when you're not using the safe room any longer, you may want to move that particular kitty litter to a new location. If you do, monitor your kitten closely during this transition as well.

If your kitten does have an accident, NEVER scold or hit him. Take him over

to the kitty litter and place him in it. Clean up the soiled area well, using an enzymatic cleaner especially designed to break down cat urine. Be more diligent in the future. If your kitten has an accident which goes undetected, such as if he runs behind the couch and does his business and you don't notice right away, your kitten may continue to use that area as a kitty litter, and this is how bad habits start. If you nip these accidents in the bud and correct them before they have a chance to turn into a habit, you will be doing yourself and your kitten a big favor in the long run.

The rule of thumb for the appropriate number of kitty litters to have available if you do have multiple cats, is to have one kitty litter per cat, plus a spare. For example, if you have 3 cats, you should have 4 kitty litter boxes. Place them in easily accessible areas, away from noisy furnaces, washing machines, driers, or anything else which may scare your cats and turn them off of using their litter boxes consistently. Even if all the cats seem to be using the same kitty litter, at least the option is there for them to use a different one. You may, however,

want to consider moving the less-used kitty litter to a more feline-desirable location.

If you are having problems and things just don't seem to be going right, you may have to plan a visit to the vet to have kitty checked out for medical issues. Please feel free to contact the Hervey Foundation for further advice.

A priceless reply letter


We wrote a letter to a small hotel in a town we planned to visit on holiday.

Concerned about ticks and Lyme?




If Lyme is on the radar...

Once your clients have answered these four simple questions, you can decide together whether vaccination against Lyme is recommended.

ADOPTABLE VERSUS "HOME-ABLE"

Below you are going to see an article written by a vet that came to me through my e-mail. She makes a very good point and it is my wish that all shelters take note of this and make changes where possible. I knew when I created the foundation many years ago that cats do not do well being kennelled for long periods of time. Some cats are very outgoing and adjust well for a short time in this kind of a situation and when people come to a shelter to look at ADOPTING they immediately go to the cat or kitten that is right at the from to the kennel meowing and putting its paw out to be petted. Often people do not take the time to look at the cat or kitten hiding in the back of the kennel as it is assumed this animal will not make a good pet. It is shy or scared, so people think this cat or kitten is unadoptable.

It is important that we all look at this from a very different perspective. Often, this cat or kitten has either been a stray trying to survive on its own, the owner has moved away and left it behind to fend for its self, or it was owner surrendered for whatever reason. If we think of how hard it is when all of a sudden everything that was familiar to them is now changed. Their favorite food dish, their favorite food, where is my special bed or blanket, and where are the humans that used to take care of me. I am now all alone, in a strange place with lots of noise and people I don't know, with strange food in my dish and I am scared and just want to go home. I am really a good cat or kitten but I don't like it here. It frightens me. I can only imagine the stress and fear that these animals are experiencing. I have found that most of these animals are HOME-ABLE, which means if given a chance and removed from that environment into a home and given some time and patience, they will come out of their shell and become a wonderful loving cat.


Cats, in many ways, are very much like people. Some people are very outgoing and adapt well to changes in their lives, but others take more time to adjust to change, and for some it can take a long time to adjust to change. Animals are not any different? These animals are often euthanized as unadoptable

and it is one of the most unfair things that happen. These animals are often exceptionally warm, loving companions once they have the opportunity to return to their comfort zone. They just need a chance. If we as Animal Shelters could give this full consideration, creating an area in our shelters marked home-able, and help to inform potential adoptees that there is great potential for these animals to be loving pets.

When I created our Foundation, I ensured the cats coming into our care lived in a home environment. It helps them adjust, they stay socialized, and while they may be a bit frightened in the beginning, it usually does not take them long to be become part of the household. A cat's natural curiosity brings them out to see what is going on around them and they naturally want to become a part of the group. So, it is not any different when you take them into your home, it just takes a bit of time. So, we as shelters, and people looking for a loving pet, please, let's not pre-judge the cat hiding in the cage, or who is hissing or growling. Take them away from that environment, give them your love, and some time, and you will most likely have a wonderful pet. Please read the story on the following page.

So, I had a thought. It may be completely whacky, but if you have time to hear me out, I would love your thoughts. The word adoptable is stuck in our animal welfare vernacular, and what it means changes based on so many factors, from individual perspectives to available resources. Recently I have been thinking that maybe the word itself puts the wrong glasses in front of our eyes.

Many of the dogs and cats I have observed in animal welfare organizations who could be potentially labeled as "unadoptable" are often dogs and cats who may just be "un-shelterable" (or shelter challenged) but quite home-able. The over-aroused, pushy, mouthy 9-month-old big dog... The fearful cat or dog... The easily over-stimulated kitty... The dog-reactive dog... These dogs and cats are often faced with long shelter stays, and depending upon the organization, may not be adoption candidates. However, in all of these cases, the animal is likely to thrive in a supportive home environment – they are very home-able.

Take the over-aroused pushy, mouthy 9-month-old. He can quickly become the dog in the shelter who is restricted – only experienced volunteers are allowed to interact with him, and only specific adopters are allowed to adopt him. If we send this same dog off with a foster who is empowered to find an adopter for the dog (utilizing a program like the one we call Adoption Ambassadors – learn more here), he is moved into a fully enriched environment and can be marketed appropriately to any adopter looking for a high-energy, mentally engaged pup to share a life with. Home-able.

The fearful cat who has been socialized prior to relinquishment and hides constantly. She may simply need to be marketed as a cat who needs extra love and patience. Again, here is a kitty who will likely

warm to home environment after a time of adjustment. In the shelter, she is impacted with change and unpredictability – in the home, she can more quickly learn patterns and adjust. Home-able. But how can we get her home?

Recently I blogged about a dog named Teddy (AKA Eddie) who was recently adopted from the Humane Society of Silicon Valley. Teddy is a good example of a potentially unadoptable dog who is home-able. Teddy was highly dog-reactive and could be a bit snarly around some people when over handled. The organization shifted their message from that of negative to transparent – Teddy may be a jerk, but you will love him. And love him, someone did! Teddy is home-able – and he is now home.


By shifting our vocabulary from "adoptable" to "homeable," we may open up options for the dogs and cats who tend to deteriorate in the shelter, dogs and cats who may not get a chance to go home, and dogs and cats we try to fix before they go home. What dogs or cats truly need behavior support before they can humanely (and/or safely) live in a home, and who simply needs to go home to live safely and humanely?

Does the concept of home-able shift the way in which you see?





To care for cats in dire need and give our less fortunate feline friends a warm, loving and caring environment that allows them to live out their lives. To attempt to find loving homes for cats and kittens that come into our care. To promote responsible pet ownership through public education, early spaying and neutering programs and promoting other care programs.







It takes 450^{lbs} of dry cat food, 75 cases of canned food and 800^{lbs} of litter <u>EVERY MONTH</u> to take care of the hundreds of stray, abandoned and unwanted cats and kittens that The Hervey Foundation for Cats takes in at their facility each year. Many of these animals find new homes — but many fall into permanent care at our facility.

ALL DONATIONS WELCOME CALL MARJORIE 780.963.4933 The Foundation was founded by Marjorie Hervey in 1998 to provide care and loving homes for the unwanted, un-cared for and abandoned cats that fall into our society. She used her family inheritance and more to start and establish The Foundation. Since that time over 3,000 cats and kittens have come into our care and most have found good, loving homes. The balance stay with us to live a quality life.

The Foundation's prime objective is to offer either a temporary or long-term place of protection for injured, unwanted, homeless and abused cats.

In line with this philosophy is the concept of HOMING - this means that we provide homes for these animals - either a new loving, caring home or permanent home at our facility for the cat to live a Quality Life for the remainder of it's life.

We provide a means of finding suitable loving and caring homes for these cats. In addition, we promote and educate the public on the proper treatment of cats.

Our primary concern is the cats under our care. Great precautions are taken to avoid introducing illness. For example, in the situation involving a typical member of the family our procedures would be as follows: Cats that come into our care are taken to an Accredited Veterinary Clinic where, at the cost of The Foundation, the animal would be examined and Feluk tested, spayed or neutered, micro-chipped, dewormed, vaccinated with the 4 way combination vaccine and Feline Leukemia and Rabies (if old enough). Its ears would be checked for ear mites and treated. The cat is then transported to our facility. It is placed in isolation for observation for 4 to 5 days. If any symptoms develop that needs attention, then the cat is treated. Assuming all is well, the cat is placed up for adoption to find it a good home. The cats in our care are not caged but are free to enjoy an home atmosphere. If it clear that a new acquisition could not be adopted for some reason or another, it is made to feel at home, is given a name, and it becomes assimilated into our family.

The Foundation is unique throughout all of Western Canada. The reason is quite simple. No person has the patience and the devotion that Marjorie has for the cats.
