Should You Worry About Your Cat's Zoomies



What are the Zoomies? They are a nickname to describe a cat's behaviour when they are darting around the home for seemingly no reason, and in many cases, giving you the crazy eyes.

Zoomies can take the shape of flying around rooms, running up to a scratching post and furiously scratching it, darting up and down stairs, running to the carpet and trying to pull it up, or running off and on your lap and around the house.

The good news is this is completely normal behaviour. There is actually a scientific name for the zoomies and it is Frenetic Random Activity Periods (FRAPS). FRAPS can be startling, but sometimes they can be funny too. Cats are mysterious creatures and watching them bolt around your home can be quite funny and entertaining.

Causes of Zoomies

There are all sorts of things that cause cats to experience the zoomies. Sometimes loud sounds will trigger them, or perhaps the act of hunting an insect, seeing their owner after a long day, being near water for any length of time,

or any number of other things that would spook or excite them.

One seemingly odd cause of the zoomies is using the litter box. To a human, we don't understand why using the bathroom would cause anyone to run full speed immediately after, but the reason for this makes a lot of sense to a wild animal. In the wild, leaving behind your scent can be a matter of life and death if a nearby predator is looking for a meal.

When to Speak to a Professional

Most cats with the zoomies will often show signs of being excited or freaked out, but it only lasts for a few moments. If your cat is experiencing the zoomies paired up with what seems to be a lot of stress or fear that doesn't dissipate quickly, you should take a trip to the vet.

Another instance where you may want to speak to a vet or behaviourist is when your cat seems to only experience the zoomies at night and it's now affecting the family.

Cats aren't nocturnal, they are known as crepuscular. They are most active at dawn and dusk, so they shouldn't technically be up all night playing.

In this case, they may need an adjustment to their feeding schedule, or perhaps there is another reason they are feeling such a burst of energy at night, in which case speaking to a vet would be the next logical move to make.

Time-sharing and How Cats Get Along Under One Roof



Cats are very different from dogs. They don't live in packs under an alpha, instead carving out their own schedules based on resource-sharing and how many other cats are in their space.

Within the house, these schedules are referred to as timesharing, as the cats naturally work out a program where each one has a chance to take advantage of areas where they can access the things they need, such as food, water, and the litter box.

Time-sharing

In a multi-cat household, timesharing usually comes about when certain resources are limited, or if there are a lot of cats. For example, if food can only be found in the kitchen, one cat may lay claim to the space in the early morning, another may lay claim to the afternoon, and so on. In that time, whichever cat 'owns' that time oversees the space and may chase others out. The same goes for the other cats throughout the day.

While our cats are domesticated, their instincts still run strong. Memorizing where important resources are, and when they can access them, is important to them. Cats like stability and do not like confrontation. If there is too much confrontation, your cats might 'unfriend' each other.

This is different from how we unfriend a person online. In the cat world, this means there will be fights or avoidance. Neither of these outcomes are good. Fighting is bad for obvious reasons, but avoidance can take the shape of hiding, sometimes for days and days at a time. This is bad for your cat's mental health – imagine living in total fear every hour of the day.

How to Fix a Bad Situation

Sometimes all it takes for cats to mend fences is the feeling of independence. As solitary beings, cats don't like being forced to share space with other cats. They love their owners, but other cats will stress them out in ways we wouldn't anticipate.

If your cats have unfriended each other, and are having trouble figuring out time-sharing, you need to take action. The best solution is to feed them in different areas. If you live with another partner, get them involved at mealtime for the cats. Have them prepare food for one cat, and while you prepare for the other, then go to either side of your home to feed each cat.

The same goes for bowls of water. As a species, cats like to explore and find it rewarding to discover new sources of water. If you have multiple cats, try placing water bowls around your home at a rate of 1.5 per cat, rounding up. 1 cat = 2 bowls of water, 2 cats = 3 bowls of water, 3 cats = 5 bowls of water, etc.

When it comes to litter, it can be hard to place it around your home if you are tight on space. It is okay for litter boxes to exist relatively close to each other but do your best to separate them. Litter boxes also are best kept with the 1.5 per cat rule but in this case, you can round down. 1 cat = 1 litter box, 2 cats = 3 litter boxes, etc.

Final Thoughts

While all cats are different, they do have a lot of common behaviours – wanting space and to feel independent is one of the most common ones. As a result, they've worked out a natural system to handle things like food, water, and the litter box. Sometimes though, we humans are unaware of how we can make life easier for them and reduce their stress. If you live in a multi-cat household, be mindful of how your cats are time-sharing at home and try your best to spread around important resources for them. This keeps stress down, and happiness up – resulting in more snuggles from your cats!



Do Cats Speak with Their Tails? What are They Saying?

Cat communication is fascinating. The way they stare, meow, chirp, and move their tails are all different ways to get our attention and speak to us, but what are they saying?

According to the experts, the way cats move their tails may be their way to signal to us and other cats about how they are feeling. As cat owners, it's important for us to try to understand these tail movements so we might be able to respond to them in a way that better meets their needs – whether they're happy, angry, or somewhere in between.

So, what does it mean when your cat moves their tail? Let's take a look at some of the most common tail movements and what they might signify.

A Slow Blink or Wink

While not a tail behaviour, we figured this was worth mentioning in an article about cat behaviour. Knowing about cat's winks and blinks is useful when also interpreting tail language as well, as they often will do this at the start of your interaction.

This is a cat's way of saying 'hello', 'I like you', or 'you seem to have good energy'. If a cat does this to you, it probably means they feel comfortable around you. Be sure to always do your best to read their body language as well. Some cats just don't respond well to being touched by strangers or people they have only met a few times before.

A Twitch or Flick

This behaviour is a common one in a cat that is frustrated

or overwhelmed. If you see your cat's tail twitching, it's best to leave them alone and let them calm down, and most will be able to do so within a couple of minutes. If you have small children playing with your cat and you see the cat's tail twitching or flicking, it might be time to get the kids to leave them alone for a while.

A Swish from Side to Side

This is a sign that your cat is feeling confident and in control. If you see your cat's tail swishing back and forth, they may be less receptive to gentle play and want to play more aggressively. Cats are independent creatures by nature and when feeling large and in charge, they may want to play rough in a way that lets them still feel they are in control.

A Low, Slow Wag

A sign of relaxation and contentment, if you see your cat wagging their tail slowly from side to side, it means they're happy and comfortable. This is usually a good time to pet them and give them some love.

A Rapid Wag

This is a sign of excitement or happiness. If you see your cat's tail rapidly moving back and forth, it means they're excited to see you or are enjoying something (like playing with a toy). This is a great time to engage with them and give them some attention. In this mindset, playing with the laser pointer, or any other toy that simulates the hunt would be a great idea. Not only does it give you a chance to further bond with your pet, but it gives them a bit of exercise as well!

A Stiff, Upright Tail

This is a sign of aggression or fear. If you see your cat's tail standing straight up in the air, it means they might be feeling threatened or ready to fight. This may not be a good time to pet them, and you likely should give them some space. This isn't an exact science, so be sure to read your cat's body language and facial expression for more information as to their state of mind.


Tail Wrapped Around You or Another Object

This is a sign of affection. If you see your cat's tail wrapped around you or another object, it means they love and care for you or the other object. This is a great time to give them some love and attention. Many cats will park themselves next to their owner and wrap their tail around their wrist. This is almost like holding hands with them! When a cat does this to you, you should feel honoured!

Final Thoughts

As you can see, cat tail language can be complex. But, by taking the time to understand what your cat's tail is telling you, you can develop a deeper bond with them and potentially respond in a way that better meets their needs. So, the next time you see your cat's tail moving, take a moment to think about what it might mean. They just might be trying to tell you something important.

he Foundation was founded by Marjorie Hervey in 1998 to provide care and loving homes for the unwanted, un-cared for and abandoned cats that fall into our society. She used her family inheritance and more to start and establish The Foundation. Since that time over 3.000 cats and kittens have come into our care and most have found good, loving homes. The balance stay with us to live a quality life.

The Foundation's prime objective is to offer either a temporary or long-term place of protection for injured, unwanted, homeless and abused cats.

In line with this philosophy is the concept of HOMING - this means that we provide homes for these animals - either a new loving, caring home or permanent home at our facility for the cat to live a Quality Life for the remainder of it's life.

We provide a means of finding suitable loving and caring homes for these cats. In addition, we promote and educate the public on the proper treatment of cats.

Our primary concern is the cats under our care. Great precautions are taken to avoid introducing illness. For example, in the situation involving a typical member of the family our procedures would be as follows: Cats that come into our care are taken to an Accredited Veterinary Clinic where, at the cost of The Foundation, the animal would be examined and Feluk tested, spayed or neutered, micro-chipped, dewormed, vaccinated with the 4 way combination vaccine and Feline Leukemia and Rabies (if old enough). Its ears would be checked for ear mites and treated. The cat is then transported to our facility. It is placed in isolation for observation for 4 to 5 days. If any symptoms develop that needs attention, then the cat is treated. Assuming all is well, the cat is placed up for adoption to find it a good home. The cats in our care are not caged but are free to enjoy an home atmosphere. If it clear that a new acquisition could not be adopted for some reason or another, it is made to feel at home, is given a name, and it becomes assimilated into our family.

The Foundation is unique throughout all of Western Canada. The reason is quite simple. No person has the patience and the devotion that Marjorie has for the cats.

Our Supporters Are Our Lifeline

Monthly donations are the lifeline of the Foundation. They are essential to help with the ongoing care of the cats and kitties. It goes towards food, litter and vet care. The Foundation is powered by volunteers - there are no paid employees of the foundation, nor do the owners/directors receive remuneration - all funds are used for the care of the animals and the operation of the Sanctuary.
